Recent Work by HARC and its Members

HARC's Practice Based Research Network (PBRN) members contribute to home visiting in several ways such as through publications and HARC surveys. Listed below are recent publications that members have shared.

Early Childhood Home Visiting's Initial Transition to Virtual Visits in Response to the COVID-19 Pandemic

Home visiting services were especially vulnerable to the disruptions caused by the pandemic and had to transition rapidly from in-home visits to virtual services with families. This <u>article</u> by Kay O'Neill, a member of HARC's leadership team, and colleagues presents on data from their study examining local programs' operational adaptations to social distancing policies, and the challenges they faced during the transition to virtual services. Findings revealed that while programs were able to rapidly transition to alternatives to in-home visits, they faced challenges in their ability to connect with families during interactive video conferencing.

Young, Low-Income Mothers' Social Relationships and Involvement in Doula Home Visiting Services

HARC member Dr. Yudong Zhang and colleagues published findings from their <u>study</u> examining mothers' service involvement with doulas during the critical early months of home visiting program engagement. Results showed that mothers who had strong relationships with their family, the father of the baby, and greater social support were able to develop strong relationships with their doula during the early months of service engagement, and that the availability of the mothers' parents was associated with less service engagement during pregnancy but more involvement postpartum.

Recovery and Parenting Support through Home Visiting

This month HARC member Rebecca Fauth and colleagues published findings from their <u>study</u> of program staff and parents to understand how two novel home visiting programs FIRST Steps Together and PAT Pilot (an adaptation of PAT) support parents with substance use disorder through home visiting.

Guide to Publishing Research Data for Secondary Analysis (OPRE Report 2023-22)

Data archiving allows for secondary data analysis to address new research questions and inform future research. This <u>OPRE brief</u> provides information for publishing of data files of federally contracted research and provides a framework for the phases of the data archiving process and lessons learned. Also highlighted are several data repositories for public use.

Calls for Research

Society for Prevention Research (SPR) 2024 Annual Meeting (May 28-31, 2024, in Washington, DC)

SPR is now accepting <u>proposal submissions</u> for their 2024 annual meeting, entitled *Advancing Partnerships and Collaborative Approaches in Prevention Science*. Areas of interest include developing and applying collaborative methods, integrating preventive interventions in partnership with the communities they serve, and innovations in community engaged research. Deadline is October 31, 2023. SPR is also looking for preconference workshops. Deadline is November 30, 2023.

Additionally, SPR is <u>calling for abstract reviewers</u> to serve on their review committee and is offering an <u>opportunity</u> for mentors and students to participate in the abstract review process.

The Administration for Children and Families' (ACF) National Research Conference on Early Childhood (NRCEC) (June24-26, 2024, in Arlington, VA)



Proposal submissions are now being accepted for the 2024 NRCEC conference. NRCEC is seeking proposals for rigorous empirical research, such as research of early childhood programs, their workforces, and interventions. NRCEC is also calling for proposal reviewers. Deadline is November 10, 2023.

Infant-Early Childhood Mental Health in Home Visiting Programs Serving Diverse Families: Promising Strategies to Support Child and Family Well-Being (October 31, 2023, from 1-2:15pm ET, virtual event)
