How to Propose a Study for HARC's Practice-based Research Network (PBRN)



Supporting Resource Equity for Oregon's Home Visiting Workforce: Exploring Program Model and Regional Differences

This month, HARC National Advisory Council member, Beth Green, and colleagues published a Learning Brief based on results from a statewide survey of home visiting staff in Oregon that focused on home visitor pay, benefits, and access to professional development. Findings revealed significant differences in pay, employment benefits, and vacation time by home visiting model and significant differences in pay, vacation time, and professional development by geographic region. This brief is available in both **English** and **Spanish**.

Using the Precision Paradigm? We'd Love to Hear from You!

At HARC, we are deeply committed to fostering collaboration and innovation in the field of home visiting research. Our Precision Paradigm is a framework that organizes and defines key concepts to enhance understanding of home visiting among practitioners and researchers and promote community engagement in the development and testing of home visiting interventions, adaptations, and enhancements. Factors Associated with Self-Reported Family Enrollment in Community Services After Referral by First Born Home Visitors

Breidenbach and colleagues adapted the Precision Paradigm to create a conceptual model to examine factors that influence family engagement with community services following a referral from First Born home visiting staff. Their <u>study</u> findings suggest that the outcomes related to referral dispositions were not only influenced by the type of referrals made but also by the participants' proactive engagement in seeking these referrals and client, home visitor, and program factors.

Enhancing Futures: Exploring the Impact of the MIHP Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies Pilot Program on Michigan Families

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, in collaboration with the University of Michigan's Youth Policy Lab, has released <u>findings from the Maternal Infant Health</u> <u>Program (MIHP) Healthy Moms, Healthy Babies Pilot Program</u>. This evaluation sought to assess the effectiveness of expanded billing services for MIHP providers in addressing the diverse needs of families and determining the impact of these enhancements on social determinants of health, health equity, and other critical family outcomes. Notably, the pilot program demonstrated a positive impact on families' self-reported determinants of health, with benefits observed for Black families and those experiencing their first pregnancy; moreover, greater benefits for independent freestanding agencies vs local health departments were observed.

RAND Summer Associate Paid Internship

Are you looking for a unique opportunity to apply your research skills to important, policyrelevant research projects? RAND is offering a **Summer Associate Paid Internship** to graduate students which includes positions in policy-relevant substantiative areas (e.g., education, health, justice policy, social and economic policy, labor, national security, cyber policy, data science, etc.) and methodological skills (e.g., quantitative analysis, qualitative analysis, machine learning, etc.). All Associates will be mentored by an experienced researcher, typically work in an interdisciplinary team, and engage in a wide range of activities to learn what it is like to work at RAND. The program is typically 12 weeks of full-time research; students receive a bi-weekly paycheck. Deadline is December 2, 2024.


