Open Science Framework

Interested in learning more about the <u>Open Science Framework</u> and resources to support research transparency and verifiability? The Center for Open Science offers tools, training, and <u>webinars</u> on topics such as study preregistration, data curation, and sharing of sensitive data.

Home Visitor Research Training Toolkit

Home visitors are critical partners in home visiting (HV) research and quality improvement projects. Developed by Northwestern University with funding from the Patient Centered Outcomes Research Institute, the goal of the **Home Visitor Research Training** is to increase the number of home visitors who partner in research by providing guidance on research design, methods, interpretation and dissemination of findings. Increasing engagement in research will help ensure that research findings are useful to HV programs and families.

The Field Guide to Human-Centered

Design

Human-centered Design (HCD) is a problem solving and design approach that prioritizes the needs and experiences of the people who will use a product or service. The method is iterative and includes engaging end users and stakeholders throughout the process, collaborating across disciplines, and considering the contexts in which the end users live and the solution operates. The Field Guide to Human-Centered Design is a free resource that explains and outlines HCD for researchers interested in using the approach.

National African American Child and Family Research Center (NAACFRC): Undergraduate Emerging Scholars Program

The NAACFRC invites <u>applications</u> for the 2025-26 Undergraduate Emerging Scholars Program. This is an 8-week mentored research internship designed for students interested in community-based participatory research on economic and social mobility, poverty alleviation, and early care and education for African American children and families. Deadline is March 7, 2025.

National African American Child and Family Research Center (NAACFRC): Graduate Emerging Scholars Program

The NAACFRC invites <u>applications</u> for the 2025-26 Emerging Scholars Program for graduate students. This is a one-year, remote-mentored research internship designed to increase the knowledge and skills of students interested in research on economic and social mobility, poverty alleviation, and early care and education for African American children and families. <u>Deadline is March 7, 2025</u>.

Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Health Policy Research Scholars

Applications are now open for the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Health Policy Research Scholars program. This four-year national leadership development initiative is designed specifically for doctoral students across various nonclinical, research-focused disciplines, emphasizing the critical role of policy as a lever for meaningful change. Scholars will gain the ability to translate and disseminate research to end users, build their capacity for individual and collective leadership, and contribute to research and dialogue on the policy changes necessary for creating conditions for good health. Deadline is March 11, 2025.
