HARC Opportunities

HARC Funding for Seed Projects or Secondary Data Analysis

HARC is offering **funding** support for up to four teams interested in conducting innovative research that explores emerging and enduring issues in early childhood home visiting. We will fund research that falls into two categories:

- 1. Research that uses shared or linked data sources
- 2. Research that leverages HARC's practice-based research network

This funding will be awarded in the form of subcontracts to selected institutions. **Up to \$35,000** in total costs will be available for each project. Additional details, including **frequently asked questions**, can be found on <u>here</u>. The deadline to submit is Monday, <u>May 5</u>.



Call for Studies

Precision Research and Evaluation Planning and Reflection Tool to Optimize Home Visiting Outcomes

A Scoping Review of Home Visiting Research Using Linked Data

One of HARC's objectives is to promote <u>data sharing and</u> <u>interoperability</u>. To this end, we conducted a<u>scoping review</u> of published, peer-reviewed research using early childhood home visiting (HV) data linked with other administrative datasets to identify data sources, methods for linkage, study designs, research questions, and outcome categories in the literature. Collectively, the included articles demonstrate the value of linking data to answer research questions that cannot be readily answered with home visiting program data alone; they also highlight gaps and opportunities for research questions, study designs, data linkage work, and partner and community engagement.


Effects of an Early Home Visiting Program on Maternal Depression

This month, HARC member Mary Dozier and colleagues published results from their **study** examining the effects of the Attachment and Biobehavioral Catch-up (ABC) home visiting program on maternal depression. They observed significant reductions in maternal depression symptoms among mothers receiving ABC; suggesting that home visiting models like ABC can leverage non-traditional mental health providers to improve maternal mental health.

Impact of Nurse Home Visitation on Take-Up of Social Safety Net Programs in a Medicaid Population

This month, HARC member Margaret McConnell and colleagues published <u>findings</u> from their randomized controlled trial evaluating the impact of the Nurse Family Partnership (NFP) home visiting program on uptake of the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). Results showed favorable effects of NFP on WIC or SNAP enrollment during pregnancy and on continued SNAP enrollment in the first two years after delivery.

Prenatal-to-3 State Policy Roadmap

<u>Prenatal-to-3 Policy Impact Center</u> compiles valuable information concerning evidence-based policies and strategies – such as home visiting - for expectant families and families with young children. Their <u>2024 Roadmap Summary</u> for home visiting shares the home visiting policy context for each state, including home visiting reach, use of Medicaid funds, and relevant state bills and legislation.

National Survey of Children's Health Child and Family Health Measures

The Data Resource Center for Child and Adolescent Health (DRC), a project of the <u>Child and</u> <u>Adolescent Health Measurement Initiative</u> (CAHMI) has released the <u>2023 National Survey</u> <u>of Children's Health (NSCH) Child and Family Health Measures</u>. Designed to be representative at both the state and national level, the 2023 NSCH has data from 55,162 children ages 0-17 years on topics such as physical, mental and emotional health, health care access and quality, community and school activities, and family health and well-being. Also explore the new <u>Whole Child Risk Index</u>, a <u>validated measure</u> associated with important outcomes such as child flourishing, educational preparedness, emergency care utilization, and forgone care. NSCH public use data files, codebooks, and related materials can be found on the <u>U.S. Census Bureau's NSCH page</u>; downloadable datasets will be available in May.

2025 Artificial Intelligence (AI) Bootcamp (June 2-3, 2025, virtual)


