Innovative Methods Webinar!

This webinar will highlight innovative methods for adaptation using an example from SafeCare in a refugee and immigrant community in Clarkston, GA. SafeCare was adapted for Afghan, Burmese, and Congolese families and implemented sing two different methods: standard implementation through community-based organizations, and 'task-shifted' implementation via trained community members. Findings for implementation outcomes (enrollment, completion, satisfaction) and family outcomes (parenting skill, parenting stress, and child socialemotional health) will be shared. All are welcome.

Hot Off the Press! Recent Work by HARC and its Members!

Association of Electronic Health Records Access and Coordination Between Primary Care Providers and Public Health Nurse Home Visitors in the United States

This month, HARC member Venice Williams and colleagues reported findings from their **study** examining nurse home visiting teams' access to electronic health records (EHR) and whether access is linked to increased collaboration with primary care providers. Results showed that EHR access varies by Nurse-Family Partnership team and agency type and is associated with greater relational coordination with primary care. Hence, expanding EHR access may help strengthen collaboration between home visitors and providers.

Educating Families on Urgent Maternal Warning Signs: Learning from a Pilot to Improve Training and Tools for Maternal and Child Home Visiting Programs

This month, HARC members Elizabeth Stierman, Kelly Bower, and colleagues published findings from a <u>pilot</u> of a maternal warning signs education intervention in home visiting programs serving populations at high risk for adverse maternal outcomes. The intervention included online training for home visitors, collaborative calls, and a client toolkit. Staff found the materials clear, well-received, and useful across clients from varied backgrounds. Program managers noted the implementation was simple and feasible. However, some toolkit components weren't used consistently, and staff requested more tools to help clients communicate with health providers. Feedback led to training adaptations including adding patient self-advocacy content. This pilot offers lessons for home visiting programs to improve early recognition and care-seeking for urgent maternal warning signs.

Perspectives of Home Visiting Providers on Internal Factors that Promote Enrollment and Continued Participation for Families

This month, HARC members Hellen Milojevich, Faith Swan, and David Bard published findings from their **study** on provider perspectives regarding enrollment and continued participation in home visiting programs. Providers viewed home visiting as highly compatible with parents' goals for their children, but noted that other priorities, such as work and food insecurity, may prevent families from enrolling or staying engaged. Although many parents are motivated to support their child's development, they may be reluctant to discuss sensitive issues such as substance use or domestic violence. Findings underscore the importance of understanding families' perceived fit with home visiting, readiness for change, and confidence in achieving positive outcomes, as well as strategies providers can use to support engagement.


