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In Memory of Deborah Daro



HARC is deeply saddened to share the passing of **Deborah Daro**, Senior Research Fellow Emeritus at Chapin Hall and a cherished member of the HARC community.

Deb served on the HARC Leadership Team from 2017 until her death in 2025. During that time, she drew on her deep expertise and extensive connections in the home visiting field to strengthen HARC's work and to serve as one of its most dedicated advocates. Her contributions included fostering collaboration across evidence-based models, identifying both emerging and enduring issues in the field, and establishing a program to support early career researchers.

Deb's wise and reflective nature made her a favorite to deliver the closing address at many HARC annual meetings. Beyond her work with HARC, Deb was recognized nationally as a leading expert in child abuse prevention policy and as a passionate champion for reforms that strengthen early childhood systems to better support families.

To her HARC colleagues, Deb was not only a trusted mentor but also a treasured friend. Her impact on the field, and on those who had the privilege of working alongside her, will be long

lasting. She will be deeply missed.

Recordings now available for HARC's *Adaptation and Implementation of the SafeCare Parenting Program: Comparing Two Implementation Methods*

In this <u>webinar</u>, Dan Whitaker highlights innovative methods for adaptation using an example from SafeCare. The model was adapted for a community in Georgia and implemented using different methods: standard implementation through community-based organizations, and 'task-shifted' implementation via trained community members. Findings for implementation outcomes (enrollment, completion, satisfaction) and family outcomes (parenting skill, parenting stress, and child social-emotional health) are shared.

New Resources from HARC

Reach in Home Visiting: An Introduction to Understanding and

Measuring Reach

This <u>brief</u> provides an overview of the concept of "reach" as one component of home visiting usage within the Precision Paradigm framework. It introduces five elements of reach and the levels at which data for each element can be collected—community, program, and family. It also includes indicators of reach with relevant examples from the field. Together, the elements and indicators can inform home visiting interventions and study designs to improve our understanding of how to reach and enroll families into an intervention that fits each family at the time that is right for them.

Hot Off the Press! Recent Work by HARC and its Members!

An exploratory study of therapeutic relationships and participant retention in a specialized home visiting program

This month, HARC member Emma Sexton and colleagues published findings from their exploratory <u>study</u> examining how various factors impact participant completion and retention in the TIES home visiting program which serves families affected by substance use. Results showed that demographic factors did not affect completion or retention, but stronger home visitor relationships and participant engagement were linked to higher odds of both.

Changes in the Utilization of Home Visiting Services During COVID-19: Analysis of the National Parents as Teachers Program

This month, HARC members Abigail Palmer Molina, Dorian Traube, and Allison Kemner published findings from their **study** investigating changes in home visiting (HV) utilization following the onset of the pandemic and the transition to virtual HV delivery. The study examined differences in predisposing factors, enabling resources, and family needs among those enrolling in the national Parents as Teachers HV program before and after the pandemic began. Findings revealed that families enrolling after the pandemic's onset showed higher levels of risk, including a greater likelihood of having a history of child abuse and neglect. Regarding enabling resources, referrals from child protective services rose, number of resource connections declined, but referrals for basic needs increased. Overall, findings suggest HV programs should prioritize families' immediate concerns and adopt a crisis intervention model as recovery from the pandemic continues.

News from the Field

Home Visiting Services with Justice-Involved Families - National Home Visiting Resource Center (NHVRC)

This NHVRC <u>brief</u> highlights five initiatives supporting justice-involved families. They promote healthy parent-child relationships, reduce trauma during incarceration, and show how home visiting can aid reentry. Supporting justice-involved families may require flexibility in service delivery, offering services in correctional settings, and using trauma-informed approaches. Key strategies include partnering with justice agencies, tailoring services locally, training staff, and maintaining a consistent presence to connect families with resources and stability.
