Hot Off the Press! Recent Work by HARC and its Members!

Home Visiting as a Bridge: Supporting Immigrant and Refugee Families Through Transition and Growth.

This month, HARC member Jon Korfmacher and colleagues published findings from their <u>report</u> examining the impact of home visiting on immigrant and refugee families including service delivery, engagement, and families' resettlement experiences. The report highlights families served, shares perspectives from the field, and provides early insights into emotional and practical needs, such as coping with loss, rebuilding belonging, and navigating new systems. These findings can guide programs, research, and policy to strengthen support for various communities.

Home Visitor Well-Being in Oregon: Influences on Stress,

Mental Health and Risk for Staff Turnover

This brief by HARC member Beth Green and colleagues examines the well-being of home visitors in Oregon. It looks at three main areas: job-related factors (such as satisfaction, safety, stress, and burnout), personal factors (including financial strain, depression, and anxiety), and risks of staff turnover. The brief examines how organizations, programs, and supervisors affect home visitor well-being, highlighting workplace supports and stressors tied to well-being and turnover. It also shows how these factors vary across groups. The findings offer guidance for leaders and managers on program changes that can better support home visitors and strengthen their ability to serve families. The brief is offered in both **English** and **Spanish**.

News and Resources from the Field

Beyond the Early Years: The Long-Term Effects of Home Visiting on Mothers, Families, and Children. Results from the Mother and Infant Home Visiting Program Evaluation (MIHOPE)

The <u>Mother and Infant Home Visiting Program Evaluation</u> (MIHOPE) kindergarten <u>followup</u> examined the effects of home visiting as children entered school, about five to seven years after families enrolled in the study. Findings showed clear benefits for mothers and families, including long-term improvements in outcomes influenced by direct interactions between home visitors and parents (such as coping skills and parenting practices), along with improvements in maternal mental health, parent-child interactions, family safety, and economic stability. For children, home visiting enhanced social-emotional functioning at home.

National Home Visiting Resource Center's 2025 Home Visiting Yearbook

The <u>National Home Visiting Resource Center</u> (NHVRC) has released its <u>2025 Home</u> <u>Visiting Yearbook</u>, a nationwide and state-by-state look at early childhood home visiting. The publication presents 2024 data from evidence-based and emerging home visiting models and from state agencies and the Administration for Children and Families to highlight:

- Where programs operate, the families they serve, and the families who could benefit but are not being reached
- Profiles of states, models, and Indigenous-led organizations

Users can navigate the NHVRC website to access data and download short publications, including the Yearbook Summary. The 2025 Yearbook includes virtual and in-person home visit data to reflect the field's hybrid approach to delivering services. It also includes links to national data sources for maternal and child health indicators to offer insight into family well-being and the potential need for services.


