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


Mark Your Calendars: HARC's First Journal Club Meeting on January 26, 2026, at 2pm ET!

Hot of the Press! Recent Work by HARC and its Members!

Association of Electronic Health Records Access and Coordination Between Primary Care Providers and Public Health Nurse Home Visitors in the United States

This month, HARC members Venice Williams and Mandy Allison, along with their colleagues, published findings from their <u>study</u> on nurse home visiting teams' access to electronic health records (EHR) and its impact on collaboration with primary care providers in the U.S. The study found that about 30% of teams had EHR access, with higher access rates in programs implemented by healthcare systems. Most teams with access reported read capabilities, documentation ability, and program referrals. EHR access was significantly associated with improved relational coordination with women's and pediatric care providers. Overall, enhancing home visitors' access to EHRs may strengthen collaboration with primary care providers.

Family Justice Involvement in Evidence-Based Home Visiting Services: Understanding Home Visitor Perceptions and Practices

This month, HARC members Dylan Jackson, Shoshana Oppenheim, Rebecca Shlafer, Rebecca Fauth, and Allison West published a <u>study</u> that examined home visitor practices, implementation supports, and perceptions of program strengths and benefits for parents in justice-involved families. The findings revealed that nearly two-thirds of home visitors worked

with these families. Notably, supervisor support was significantly and positively associated with home visitor practices, such as modifying the content of visits, for justice-involved families. In contrast, cognitive barriers, such as concerns about potential family dropout, were significantly and negatively associated with these practices. Furthermore, home visitors' perceptions of their program's strengths and benefits for justice-involved families were linked to various implementation supports, as well as their knowledge and self-efficacy.


